Days and months - <u>January</u>, <u>March</u>, Wednesday, Tuesday (not seasons autumn, spring, summer, winter)

Names of cities and towns, - London, Paris, Tehran, Westminster.

Countries - Iraq, England, the UK, Britain, Italy.

Nationalities and Languages - English, Arabic, Kurdish, Iraqi, Iranian.

Names of people - Joanne Rudling, Ali, Mounira, Peter Hart. Mr Smith

Titles - Miss Rudling, Mr Ahmed, Mrs Rashid, Mr Hart, Dr Parker.

Names of streets, places, rivers, mountains, parks - Hyde Park, Regents Park, the River Thames, Oxford Street, Gatwick Airport, Heathrow.

Institutions - the Home Office, City of Westminster College, Oxford University, the Houses of Parliament, L'ondon Underground.

Shops and restaurants - Abu Ali, Café Nero, Harrods, Tesco, Safeway

Brand names - Adidas, Nokia, Ford Fiesta, Mars Bar, Orange, Vodafone.

Books, films, newspapers and magazines - The Sun, The Times, The Matrix, Romeo and Juliet, The Evening Standard, Metro, Vogue, She.
